Arapahoe Ridge Elementary School ADAMS 12 FIVE STAR SCHOOL DISTRICT Reading/Writing Connections and Reading

Introduction

Arapahoe Ridge Elementary School is part of Adams 12 Five Star School District, a large, diverse, and expanding district. Under the leadership of Marilyn Jerde, the school began their work with Regie Routman in 2002 with the goal of creating a culture of professional learning and high quality instruction for every student. Marilyn served as the principal through 2006, when she moved to her current role as Executive Director of Elementary Schools. Trena Speirs became the principal and continues to work with Regie and support and sustain the quality instructional changes that continue to occur at Arapahoe Ridge Elementary.

Student Performance Data

Even through staff and administrative changes that included a new principal and turnover of 24 teachers, Arapahoe maintains strong scores and continued growth in CSAP reading data. The following chart captures reading scores prior to Regie Routman's residencies through 2007.

Lessons Learned

- Examining beliefs and establishing a set of common beliefs about how kids learn to read is key in opening the lines of communication, developing and adopting a set of consistent practices across grade levels,
- Whole-school, on-site professional development provides a staff with opportunities to build a common knowledge base-specific to the needs of the participants.
- Above all, make time for weekly professional conversations.
- Establish a strong leadership team. Encourage teachers to take on the role of teacher-leaders by setting up professional conversations among themselves, providing articles and questions for discussion, peer observation, etc.
- An effective principal is very involved in all aspects of the onsite-professional development program—from being a member of the leadership team to facilitating professional development sessions to team-teaching and classroom observations.
- Reflection is vital for meaningful and lasting change.
- Establish a focus on independent reading, classroom libraries, and reading for pleasure.
- Ensure that students are reading independently everyday.

Marilyn Jerde, Former Principal: With an unrelenting focus on high expectations and effective teaching, Arapahoe Ridge was transformed from a good school to a great school. Guided reading is used as a catalyst to move readers forward depending upon their strengths, while literature discussions and read alouds provide opportunities for modeling comprehension strategies.

Robin Woods, Teacher: I learned that the goal of reading instruction goes beyond teaching children how to read...it is about getting kids to love to read and want to read on their own for the fun of it. During Independent Reading, I now spend my time talking with my students about their reading interests, and I steer them in the direction of great books.
